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MESSAGE FROM THE ATTORNEY GENERAL

Dear Law Enforcement Official:

The use of DNA evidence is critical to effective law enforcement and is growing in use and acceptance by the courts

Studies now show that the use of DNA evidence is the most cost effective and efficient method of quickly assisting law enforcement efforts. The Wisconsin Department of Justice has determined that the operations of the Madison and Milwaukee DNA Units and the DNA Databank Unit would benefit from a review and renewal of their programs and processes.

The DNA facilities have operated effectively since 1993 but new approaches to analysis and new technologies have emerged that the laboratories could use to reduce costs and improve processing time and volume. Implementing these technologies would enhance service to Wisconsin's law enforcement community and support faster disposition of cases.

To take advantage of these new processes and new technologies, the Crime Laboratories will undertake a project to study the processing methods used by the two DNA Units and the DNA Databank. We will also develop a long range plan for DNA testing in Wisconsin, which may include in its implementation the introduction of robotics into the Crime Laboratories.

Funding for this project is made possible through a sub-grant from Fox Valley Technical College, to which we are very grateful. DOJ will hire an independent consultant to conduct a process mapping of the DNA sections, as a part of our plan. A "Request for Services" has been released and we are in the process of selecting the consultant. We hope to begin the study in September of this year.

The goal of this effort is to review all of our current processes and ensure that we are using the most effective and efficient methods for DNA testing. Our success will help us all in our ongoing work to serve and protect the citizens of Wisconsin.

State v. Tyrone Dubose

2005 WI 126

**Decided by the Wisconsin Supreme Court
on July 14th, 2005**

Introduction:

This case deals with the issue of eyewitness identifications, specifically the show up procedure. While this case does not abolish showups it severely limits their use. The court believes that showups are a chancy procedure that create a great risk of mis-identification and thus held that they should only be permitted when they are necessary and then should only be employed in conformity with certain practices.

Facts:

The victim had been drinking at a local tavern where he encountered the defendant, among others. The victim believed that he had seen the defendant previously at a liquor store. Eventually the victim and the defendant ended up at an apartment whereupon the defendant robbed the victim at gun point.

Quickly a police investigation assisted by a canine pursuit led to the discovery of the defendant hiding behind a fence a few blocks from the robbery site. The police arrested the defendant and then transported him via police squad to the victim for a show up procedure. The victim looked at the defendant in the squad car and made a positive identification that the person in the squad as the person who had robbed him.

The defendant was convicted at trial during which the victim testified as to the show up identification and also positively identified the defendant at trial.

Defendant's Position:

The defendant argued that the show up identification should have been suppressed since show up identifications are impermissibly suggestive. The defendant proposed a rule that all show up identifications are per se inadmissible.

The State's Position:

The state argued that the show up identification in this case should be admissible as evidence as under current law the procedure was not impermissibly suggestive and also that the identification it produced was reliable.

The Wisconsin Supreme Court Holding:

The Wisconsin Supreme Court agreed with the defendant that the show up in this case was unlawful and the identification it produced was inadmissible. However the court refused to adopt the defendant's request for a rule of per se exclusion of show up identifications. The court criticized show up identifications as being very suggestive but conceded that they do have a potential role in investigations in certain situations. The new court rule is that the show up identification procedure should be utilized only when under the totality of the circumstances a show up is necessary. The court found that the show up in this case was not necessary as the police had already arrested the defendant and thus could have arranged for a more reliable identification procedure such as a lineup or a photo array.

Moreover the court held that in those limited occasions where a show up can be employed, that the police follow best practices. These practices include neutral introductions, like, "this may or may not be the subject" and "the investigation will continue whether you can make an identification or not". Also the police should avoid putting the subject to be identified in a squad car and should if possible not have the subject handcuffed, as these practices are unduly suggestive.

Note:

While this case does not abolish showups it does restrict its use to only those situations where they are absolutely necessary under the totality of the circumstances. Whenever possible or plausible the police should discard the show up option in favor of a photo array or a lineup. If a show up is necessary, such as a pre-arrest investigatory detention scenario the police should be careful in conducting the procedure so as to avoid any practices that are unduly suggestive.



Staff Opening – Start Here....

A WILENET milestone was reached in July when the Oconomowoc Police Department submitted a job posting for a police officer. This was the 1000th job opening to be announced using WILENET's on-line employment opportunity form. That's an average of nearly one submission per day since the feature was created in July 2002.

The response to on-line employment opportunities has been especially positive. Agencies find the fill-in-the-blank form easy to use and are pleased with the response from applicants. While administering a test to police officer candidates this past spring, one agency found that 103 of the 108 applicants had learned of the job opening via WILENET. Another agency contacted the Department of Justice asking them to remove their announcement two weeks before the application deadline date because the response to their ad had been so overwhelming. Yet another agency reported that they received their first request for application materials just 2 hours after the announcement was posted on WILENET.

All WILENET job announcements are posted free of charge. If the announcement meets printing deadlines it will also be published in the Law Enforcement Bulletin. The announcement submission form is located outside the password-protected area of WILENET so it can be accessed by human resources staff as well as police personnel.

FBI OFFICERS KILLED

These statistics represent preliminary information received by the FBI, January through June 2005: Thirty-one law enforcement officers have been killed due to criminal actions. During the same time period in 2004, 30 officers were slain. In 2005, 16 officers were slain in the south, eight in the midwest, six in the west, and one in the northeast. Of the 31 officers slain, eight were performing traffic stops, seven were ambushed, four were investigating suspicious persons or circumstances, four were answering robbery calls, two were attempting other arrests, two were involved in tactical situations, two were involved in investigative activities, one was answering domestic disturbance call, and one was handling prisoner(s). Firearms were used in 28 of the killings (23 handguns, three shotguns, and two rifles) and three vehicles. Fourteen officers were wearing protective vests. There have been 31 separate incidents in which these 31 officers have been slain. Thirty of the 31 incidents have been cleared by arrest or exceptional means. Twenty law enforcement officers have been accidentally killed. During the same time period in 2004, 38 officers were accidentally killed. In 2005, 13 officers were killed in automobile accidents, three were struck by vehicles, two were accidentally shot, one was fatally injured due to a

fall, and one officer drowned. Nine deaths occurred in the south, seven in the midwest, two in the northeast, one in the west, and one in Puerto Rico.

Incident Summaries

Llano County Sheriff's Department, Texas, Deputy Sheriff, aged 27, with four years law enforcement experience with agency was shot on 05/08/2005. At approximately 11:19 p.m., deputy initiated traffic stop for suspicion of fictitious license. Deputy provided dispatcher with license plate number, Texas driver's license number, and vehicle registration number. Next radio transmission was from citizen advising dispatcher that victim deputy was laying near patrol vehicle with apparent gunshot wound to head. After extensive investigation and search, subject located approximately ten hours later in rural area. While Texas Department of Public Safety helicopter pilots were directing arresting officers to subject's location, subject committed suicide. Victim deputy transported to hospital and pronounced dead on 05/09/2005 at 3:30 p.m. Preliminary investigation indicated subject recently paroled in Pennsylvania for robbery. Subject committed suicide with same RG 22 mag pistol used to kill victim deputy.

Battle Creek Police Department, Michigan, Veteran Detective, aged 44, with 20 years law enforcement experience with agency was fatally shot on 05/09/2005. At approximately 4:20 p.m., two detectives investigating homicide of taxi cab driver, which occurred on 04/26/2005, followed stale lead from telephone number located at scene of homicide to apartment address. Detectives approached residence and rang doorbell but door was not answered. Movement from inside residence was heard so one detective went around to back door while other detective stayed at front door. Detective observed someone through window in back of residence and told individual to go to front door. As detective was walking back to front door, he heard shots coming from front of residence. Detective observed subject with sawed-off shotgun standing over victim detective, fatally wounded in chest, no body armor. When detective returned to front of residence, subject fired shotgun, striking him in leg. Wounded detective returned fire. Unwounded subject fled, taking fatally wounded detective's .40 caliber Glock service weapon. Recovered at scene sawed-off shotgun, victim's holster, and bus tickets to Chicago purchased at noon on 05/09/2005. Minutes later subject car jacked truck from citizen. Truck was recovered few minutes later. Another car jacking was reported to police department and multi-agency, federal, state, county, local cooperative effort to locate subject was initiated. At about 4:21 a.m. on 05/10/2005, subject was spotted by citizen in Dearborn, Michigan area. Dearborn police attempted to effect traffic stop on subject, however, subject led police on high-speed chase into Detroit where he crashed vehicle. Subject then fled on foot and car jacked vehicle from citizen leaving commercial establishment. Subject attempted to flee but was quickly apprehended by law enforcement. Victim detective's service weapon was recovered.

Livingston County Sheriff's Office, Kentucky, Veteran Deputy Sheriff, aged 52, with five years law enforcement experience with agency was fatally shot on 06/02/2005 at approximately 11:30 p.m. Deputy sheriff responded to 911 call, which came from teenager reporting domestic dispute between two individuals, one of them being teenager's father. Once deputy sheriff entered residence, teenager's father went to basement and retrieved firearm. Subject and deputy sheriff subsequently exchanged gunfire whereby both were fatally shot. Teenage daughter was shot in leg.

Prince George's County Police Department (PGCOPD), Maryland, Veteran Corporal, aged 41, with 18 years law enforcement experience with agency was fatally shot on 06/21/2005 at

approximately 11 a.m. Corporal and two other PGCOPD officers were pursuing vehicle occupied by two subjects. Vehicle pulled into parking lot of apartment complex and both subjects exited vehicle. Gunfire erupted between one subject and PGCOPD officers. Victim corporal sustained bullet wounds in shoulder and abdomen from subject's .40 caliber Smith and Wesson handgun. Victim corporal taken to area hospital where he succumbed to injuries. Subject also received gunfire wounds and taken to area hospital where he remains in critical condition and in custody. Subject charged with murder of victim corporal. Second subject fled into apartment building and later taken into custody. He was not charged.

Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department, California, Veteran Deputy Sheriff, aged 35, with 15 years law enforcement experience was fatally shot on 06/24/2005 at approximately 3:15 p.m. Deputy was conducting an attempt murder investigation involving subject in Hawaiian gardens. While deputy was conducting interview with woman on front porch of residence, subject, standing behind front door, fired .38 caliber revolver through gap of hinged side of open door. Gunshot struck victim deputy on left side of head, instantly killing him. Intensive manhunt ensued involving over 100 sheriff's deputies. After approximately nine hours, subject was located hiding in bathtub three houses away from crime scene. Subject was arrested without incident and charged with murder.

Dinwiddie County Sheriff's Office, Virginia, Veteran Lieutenant, aged 59, with 16 years law enforcement experience was fatally shot on 06/27/2005 at approximately 1:30 p.m. Lieutenant was transporting juvenile prisoner from judicial proceeding back to juvenile detention facility. It is believed while en route, subject jumped from back seat of vehicle to front seat where struggle ensued. Subject gained control of lieutenant's firearm and shot victim lieutenant in arm and abdomen. Subject fled scene and turned himself in shortly thereafter. Victim lieutenant was taken to local medical facility where he later succumbed to injuries. Subject was also treated for gunshot wound and is in custody under capital murder charges.

2005 DOJ Criminal Justice Conference

October 12 – 14, 2005 The La Crosse Center

The Crime Information Bureau is proud to announce the agenda for this year's conference to be held at the La Crosse Center on October 12th through 14th. This year's plenary session will focus on the topical subject of consolidation of criminal justice services. We hope to have representatives from variety of agencies that have consolidated services, such as law enforcement, emergency dispatch, booking and municipal court services. Discussed will be the issues faced when considering consolidation.

Breakout sessions include extended sessions on the TIME System and eTIME, along with another session on criminal records and electronic records submission will be offered. Other topics planned are Using and Managing Computer-based Training (TRAIN), WILENET, Technology Assets Available through the Division of Criminal Investigation, Investigating Internet Crime and Identity Theft. We have also invited the Department of Transportation to address changes to their files and how to interpret driver and vehicle inquiry responses. The Department of Corrections will demonstrate the LOCATOR system. The Office of Justice Assistance will give an update on the WIJIS Project and hold sessions on Uniform Crime Reporting.

The conference will begin at 1:00 PM on Wednesday October 12th and conclude at noon on Friday October 14th. 7594 – SEXUAL MISCONDUCT – Manistique Public Safety, MI

On November 2, 2003, at approximately 6:10 p.m., two females with their two sons were walking on the boardwalk along Lake Michigan in the City of Manistique. When they began their walk it was light and there were two cars parked in the east lot of the boardwalk. One of the vehicles had a male subject in it who appeared to be sleeping. This vehicle had Wisconsin plates. The second vehicle was known by the females and had Michigan plates. As it was starting to get dark the females and their two sons returned to the east parking lot where they had begun. As they walked across a wooden bridge they observed a tall thin white male sitting on a bench wearing a leather S&M-type hood that completely covered his face. The man was seated with his hands behind his back and a black leather strap ran down his back. The man had no other clothing on. The females left the area to call the police and when they came back the man and the vehicle with Wisconsin plates were gone.

Officers on scene were able to recover a cigarette butt the suspect had left at the scene. This evidence did produce a DNA sample that is currently in CODIS.
