MESSAGE FROM THE ATTORNEY GENERAL

Dear Law Enforcement Official:

Wisconsin law enforcement is playing a leading role in proposing and managing positive change to avoid wrongful convictions. The Wisconsin Department of Justice, working with local law enforcement officials, has now proposed a series of innovative changes, and provided training throughout the state. These relatively simple procedural changes in how we establish eyewitness identifications are expected to result in dramatic improvements.

DNA science has already been used to exonerate 159 people in the United States and social science studies clearly demonstrate the benefits of our guidelines for eyewitnesses. Eyewitness evidence has been shown to be far more reliable if several simple steps are taken in the process. Victims and witnesses can be better prepared as they go into a line-up. For example, it is preferable to present subjects or photos sequentially rather than simultaneously, to avoid a mistaken selection of one suspect based on superficial appearances. By using these and other best practice guidelines, dedicated criminal justice practitioners in Wisconsin can make a difference without expensive legislative mandates or increased costs to our communities.

Recent best practice seminars on eyewitness identification included presentations by Gary Wells from the University of Iowa, cited as the leading social scientist in this area. The seminars have been praised by Wisconsin law enforcement agencies as thorough, workable, and effective responses to the issues faced by officers gathering eyewitness information. Those who have attended the seminars leave with a solid understanding of the challenges, along with a student manual containing substantial resources they can use with their agencies to help implement meaningful change. As a follow-up to these seminars, DOJ is developing updates to both basic recruit training and our recently piloted "new investigator academy," scheduled again for September 2005.

I will soon be working in cooperation with Marquette Law School, the State Bar and UW-Madison Law School, to continue to address the serious ongoing issues involved in wrongful convictions. We are convening a work group, the Criminal Justice Study Commission, to examine wrongful conviction issues and propose initiatives and efforts to continuously improve the quality of justice for everyone in Wisconsin. The commission will be examining issues such as interrogation recording, statute of limitations for certain offenses, accomplice / jailhouse snitches, access to public defenders, access to DNA testing, and biased investigation (tunnel vision/blinders), among others.

Wisconsin law enforcement continues to evolve as a complex social enterprise performed by highly skilled professionals. I look forward to working together for protection and safety of all of our citizens, and the men and women of Wisconsin law enforcement.

State v. Reed

2005 WI 53

**Decided by the Wisconsin Supreme Court
in May, 2005**

Affirmed the earlier appellate decision of State v. Reed and reversed the earlier appellate decision of State v. Espinoza

Introduction:

This case was originally decided by the court of appeals and was the subject of a "Legal POINTS" in an earlier law enforcement bulletin publication. Since that time it went to the Wisconsin Supreme Court, which affirmed the appellate holding that the defendant committed obstruction when he gave false information in connection with denying his involvement in an OWI case. **HOWEVER** the Supreme Court broke new ground when it additionally held that it is also obstruction when a defendant lies about his involvement but does not implicate others as the defendant Reed did in this case. In other words the Supreme Court reversed the earlier appellate holding in State v. Espinoza, which had held that simple lying to "save one's skin" is not obstruction so long as it does not involve falsely implicating others. Consequently the court removed the denial of wrongdoing exception to the obstruction statute.

Facts:

Late on a Saturday night a patrol officer passed a car parked alongside the highway and saw a person sitting in the driver's seat. The officer went to the scene to see what the matter was and now noted that the person was now sitting in the passenger's seat. The officer made contact with the subject in the vehicle, the defendant, and noted that the defendant's eyes were glassy and bloodshot and that his speech was slurred. The defendant immediately told the officer that he had not been driving the car because he was drunk. The defendant claimed that a person named Mr. Triller had been the driver, had pulled the car over to the side of the road due to an argument and had walked away.

The officer asked the defendant to perform field sobriety tests and the defendant refused to do so because he claimed that he had not been driving. The officer arrested the defendant and then arranged for another officer to look for Mr. Triller. Eventually Mr. Triller was located and he told the police that he was not with the defendant that night. The defendant was charged with both OWI and obstruction and appealed his obstruction charge to the appellate court.

Defendant's Position:

The defendant argued that the obstruction charge was without merit because of the earlier decided case of *State v. Espinoza*, 2002 WI App 51, 250 Wis. 2d 804. In *Espinoza* the court of appeals had held that a person's denial of guilt when confronted by a police officer about an alleged crime can not be a basis by itself for an obstruction charge. Therefore the defendant contends that he can not be charged with obstruction in this case because he was merely trying to avoid an OWI charge.

The State's Position:

The state argued that the defendant went farther than merely falsely denying his involvement as he falsely identified another person as being involved.

The Wisconsin Supreme Court Holding:

The Wisconsin Supreme Court agreed with the state and agreed with the earlier appellate decision that Reed's conduct in this case constituted obstruction under the statute. However the court went farther and overruled *Espinoza* and held that just a mere denial of wrong doing, which proves to be false is obstruction. The court reasoned that the statute does not have any expressed exception for false denials even if they do not implicate others.

Note:

Handle with Care. While this very recent Supreme Court decision is very pro-police it does not mean you should be piling on obstruction charges every time a defendant say he/she did not do it. As the court explained obstruction occurs when a person knowingly gives false information to a law enforcement officer with the intent to mislead the officer in the performance of his/her duties. However the court also cautioned that people make mistakes and that often mistaken answers are not false statements made with the intent to mislead the police. The court warned both the police and prosecutors to have sound reasons to believe the defendant made false statements to knowingly mislead the police before considering an obstruction charge.

PATROL ACADEMY WILL TURN FIFTY

On December 13th, 1955 forty-nine state traffic officers received their commissions and badges of authority in a historical ceremony in Madison. They were the first product of the newly created Wisconsin State Patrol Academy and they were the first of nearly 2,500 troopers and inspectors who have since graduated from this auspicious law enforcement institution in the nearly 50 years since its founding.

On September 9th and 10th, 2005, these graduates and all who followed them will be honored as the Academy commemorates its Golden Anniversary of providing law enforcement basic and advanced training to not just troopers and inspectors of the State Patrol but also to hundreds of local law enforcement personnel as well.

A two-day celebration will begin on the 9th of September with a social evening at the Cranberry Lodge in Tomah, Wisconsin, and on the next day at the Academy at Fort McCoy where an Open House will feature displays of old and new patrol equipment, uniforms and other historical memorabilia, which will trace the evolution of state law enforcement from the 30's to the present.

A social hour and banquet featuring prominent speakers and entertainment will continue in Tomah that evening, providing all current and former Academy graduates, including local law enforcement personnel and friends of the Academy an ample opportunity for reminiscence and renewal of acquaintances.

All of the above are urged to mark are urged to mark their calendars well in advance setting aside September 9th and 10th, 2005, and passing the work to all of their peers to do the same.

FBI OFFICERS KILLED

These statistics represent preliminary information received by the FBI, January through April 2005: Twenty law enforcement officers have been killed due to criminal actions. During the same time period in 2004, 22 officers were slain. In 2005, eleven officers were slain in the south, six in the midwest, two in the west, and one in the northeast. Of the 20 officers slain, seven were performing traffic stops, four were ambushed, two were answering robbery calls, two were investigating suspicious persons or circumstances, two were involved in tactical situations, two were attempting other arrest, and one was involved in investigative activity. Firearms were used in 19 of the killings (14 handguns, two shotguns, one rifle, and two unknown firearm type) and one vehicle. Six officers were wearing protective vests. There have been 20 separate incidents in which these 20 officers have been slain. Nineteen of the 20 incidents have been cleared by arrest or exceptional means. Thirteen law enforcement officers have been accidentally killed. During the same time period in 2004, 20 officers were accidentally killed. In 2005, nine officers were killed in automobile accidents, two were struck by vehicles, one was accidentally shot, and one officer drowned. Six deaths occurred in the midwest, four in the south, two in the northeast, and one in the west.

Incident Summaries

Harvey County Sheriff's Department, Kansas, Veteran Deputy Sheriff, aged 38, with over 17 years law enforcement experience was fatally shot on 04/09/2005. Late evening on 04/08/2005, Newton Police Department received 911 emergency call from 14-year-old female indicating her mother was involved in domestic disturbance with mother's boyfriend and reported subject was armed. Responding officers declared barricaded hostage situation since subject was holding adult female inside residence. Multi-department emergency response team was dispatched to scene along with hostage negotiators. Negotiations with subject continued until approximately 3 a.m. on 04/09/2005. Negotiators were talking with suspect and hostage in doorway of house when subject pulled hostage back inside. Officers on scene believed hostage was in imminent danger and executed forced entry utilizing ballistic shield. Subject fired seven rounds with .45 caliber handgun at entry team; one victim deputy sheriff fatally shot in face and another officer shot in arm and leg. Other officers returned gunfire,

removed wounded officers from inside house, and established perimeter. Matter resolved approximately 8 a.m. when subject surrendered; although, subject still physically resisted. Subject was charged with capital murder, two counts attempted capital murder, criminal possession firearm, and aggravated kidnapping.

Providence Police Department (PPD), Rhode Island, Veteran Detective, aged 50, with 27 years law enforcement experience was fatally shot on 04/17/2005. On afternoon of 04/16/2005, at approximately 1:43 p.m., woman was assaulted and stabbed in back by subject during attempted robbery. Witness gave description of subject and registration of vehicle to authorities. Subject was located, taken into custody, and transported to PPD headquarters for questioning on evening of 04/16/2005. At about 11:00 p.m. an unrelated shooting occurred and many detectives responded, leaving only three detectives in detective area. Subject was taken to conference room in detective area and questioned by two detectives. Around midnight, subject requested cup of water. Detectives had previously granted this request. Detective left fellow detective alone with subject in conference room. Since subject had not been arrested, he was not handcuffed during questioning. Subject left his seat, locked door to conference room, and assaulted detective who was left alone in room. Subject quickly overpowered detective, obtaining detective's .40 caliber service weapon and fatally shot Victim Detective in chest and head. Subject entered adjacent office, shot out glass window, and jumped sixty feet to ground. Subject immediately fled area using overpass street to cross Route 95 and entered downtown Providence. Taxi driver received call from individual, who stated he had \$500, requesting pickup from downtown Providence to Boston. Taxi driver reported call to PPD. At approximately 12:50 a.m., officers converged on area and arrested subject who violently resisted arrest. Subject was charged with murder.

Chillicothe Police Department, Ohio, Veteran Officer, aged 44, with 19 years law enforcement experience with agency was fatally shot on 04/21/2005. At approximately 8:52 p.m., department officers responded to report of stolen motor vehicle at local restaurant. Shortly thereafter, officers responded to armed robbery call, which occurred at gas station. Witnesses at scene of armed robbery furnished information, which identified vehicle utilized by robber as same motor vehicle reported stolen from restaurant. At about 9:10 p.m., officer attempted traffic stop of this motor vehicle in alley way. Subject abandoned stolen vehicle and fled down alley on foot. Officer pursued but lost sight of

subject when subject turned and ran down adjoining alley. As pursuing officer approached adjoining alley he heard two distinct gunshots. Officer, believing he was being fired upon, took cover. Additional officers arrived at scene and found body of off-duty officer in dark area of alley. Apparently robber fled down alley where off-duty officer just left his parent's residence and was walking to his residence when he surprised subject who was fleeing/hiding from pursuing officer. Crime scene analysis reflects unarmed off-duty officer had no knowledge that he was chasing armed robber. Victim officer died immediately from one gunshot wound to upper front torso attempting to apprehend subject. Victim officer's cell phone was found in his right hand and his personal keys located next to his left hand. Extensive crime scene search did not result in recovery of second fired round. Initial ballistic review of bullet recovered through autopsy reflect bullet to be either .38 or .357 caliber jacketed hollow-point round fired from handgun manufactured by either S&W, Ruger, Taurus, or FIA. Subject remains at large.

Atlanta Police Department, Georgia, Veteran Officer, aged 31, with six years law enforcement experience with agency was fatally shot on 04/23/2005. At approximately 8:30 p.m., three officers assigned to specialized tactical drug interdiction squad patrolling in marked vehicle near park observed vehicle occupied by two individuals. Officer stopped patrol car next to and slightly behind vehicle placing spotlight on suspect vehicle while other officer, front passenger, inquired what subject, driver of vehicle, was doing. Subject immediately started to reach under front seat or towards center console. Officer inquiring of subject's actions exited patrol vehicle while officer, back passenger, exited rear of patrol car, running around to passenger side of subject's vehicle. Officer operating patrol car exited vehicle taking position near trunk of patrol car. Subject discharged Rossi .38 caliber handgun fatally wounding victim officer in head above right eye. Subject continued discharging weapon three more times. Officer positioned near trunk of patrol car attempting to assist fatally wounded officer received gunshot wound to left cheek, exiting near left ear. Officer located at passenger side of subject's vehicle

struck subject 11 times out of 12 rounds fired, fatally wounding subject. Passenger of subject's vehicle was struck two times during gunfire exchange. Wounded officer and passenger, later charged with probation violation, were treated and released from hospital.

Los Angeles International Airport Police Department, California, Officer, aged 35, with four year law enforcement experience with agency was fatally injured on 04/29/2005. At approximately 11:05 a.m., officer had encounter with pedestrian. Witness observed subject push officer to ground behind officer's marked patrol vehicle. According to witness, subject entered officer's vehicle and drove away at high rate of speed. As subject pulled away, officer attempted to gain entry into vehicle via driver's side door. Officer grabbed onto door frame at which time subject accelerated across traffic lanes, carrying officer outside driver's side door. Subject then collided with curb, several small trees, and fire hydrant thus rendering officer's patrol vehicle inoperable. Victim officer's body was torn from patrol vehicle by force of collisions, killing him instantly. Subject exited patrol vehicle and attempted to take another witness' vehicle; however, her doors were locked. Subject then stole individual's vehicle who stopped to render aid. Subject fled from location in stolen vehicle at high rate of speed, driving approximately 300 yards at which time he collided with curb. As result of collision, vehicle jumped over fence onto airport property. When fire fighters from Los Angeles Fire Department removed subject from vehicle, they noticed subject attempted to slice his wrists with glass. Subject was transported to local hospital for treatment and is expected to survive. Upon release from hospital, subject is expected to be booked at Los Angeles County Jail for murder.

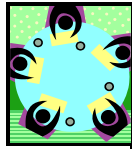
